

Introduction to the Book of Daniel

Historical Background

- **Author & Date:** Daniel, a Jewish exile, wrote the book in Babylon during the **6th century BC**. Many scholars place final compilation between **605–530 BC**. The historical context includes the **Babylonian exile** (beginning with Nebuchadnezzar's capture of Jerusalem in 605 BC) and the subsequent **Medo-Persian empire**.
- **Historical Setting:** Daniel was a young noble of Judah taken into Babylonian captivity. He was trained in the **Babylonian court**, immersed in the culture and language, while maintaining his **Jewish faith and identity** (Daniel 1).
- **Geopolitical Context:** The book covers Babylon, Medo-Persia, Greece, and briefly Rome (prophetically). Babylon was at its height under Nebuchadnezzar, and later fell to Cyrus the Persian. The **location of Babylon** near the Euphrates River made it a center of wealth, learning, and idolatry.

Geological & Cultural Background

- Babylon was a **fertile, strategically located city** in Mesopotamia, with massive walls, the Euphrates River running through it, and famous structures like the **Hanging Gardens**.
- The Babylonian culture emphasized **idolatry, astrology, dream interpretation, and imperial bureaucracy**, all of which Daniel navigated while remaining faithful to God.
- The exiled Jews were **culturally pressured** to assimilate, but Daniel and his companions exemplified **faithful obedience to the Torah**, refusing food defiled by idols or defiling practices (Daniel 1:8–16).

Biblical Context & Purpose

- **Theme:** God's sovereignty over history and nations; faithfulness under persecution; the certainty of God's kingdom.
- Daniel serves both as a **historical narrative** (chapters 1–6) and **prophetic/apocalyptic vision** (chapters 7–12).

- The book shows how God preserves His people in exile and reveals **future events**, particularly the coming of the **Messiah** and the **kingdom of God** (Daniel 2:44; 7:13–14).
 - Daniel is frequently cited in the New Testament, especially in **Jesus’ references to the Son of Man** (Daniel 7:13–14; Matthew 24:30; Mark 14:62).
